



# Ash Wednesday Service

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday. Lent is a time for penance by all Christians. Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our own mortality and confess our sins before God within the community of faith. *The imposition of ashes in this service is made available for all who wish to take advantage of this gesture of prayer and repentance to begin the Lenten season. It is **not** intended for a show of piety. We use the ashes as a sign of God's grace, who in Christ allows and by the Spirit enables us to turn again to be disciples. We pray with and for one another. We call one another to remember our baptism. At the conclusion of the service, all are invited to turn to a neighbor, in a gesture of God's grace, in our baptism and through Christ's self-offering, to clean the ashes from their neighbor's forehead.*

So we begin a journey through the wilderness of Lent with the marks of our human brokenness upon us. Accompany us on the way; forgive us as we stumble; encourage us as we learn the way of discipleship; bring us safely to the cross and the empty tomb. Restore us to wholeness, and embrace us in your steadfast love.

***Turn to us in your mercy, O God, and redeem us. Amen.***
